Words from a Survivor...

Voices Against Violence held our Clothesline Project display on Plymouth's Town Common as part of Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Following the Clothesline Project, we held our annual Candlelight Vigil to remember those who lost their lives in the past year due to domestic violence. During the vigil an advocate read a letter a previous client wished to share. She spoke about when she was first introduced to domestic violence at the age of 15 and how she knew of no resources since domestic violence is most commonly kept as a secret. She continues to say...

"Before I was abused, like most people un-effected by abuse, I didn't understand how someone abused could stay in a relationship and continue to be abused. What most people don't understand is that domestic violence feeds off of fear and emotions caused by an imbalance of power. Loving your abuser and hoping and praying that he will change and the abuse will stop becomes part of your daily routine. Fearing him and the unknown is also something that keeps you in your situation. Leaving isn't easy!"

In New Hampshire one in three women are a victim of a physical assault by an intimate partner. Though domestic violence is prevalent, even in our small rural community, across the country and the world, it stands as one of the most unreported crimes. There are many reasons why "just getting up and leaving" proves to be more challenging than most of our populations want to believe. Many victims fear no one will believe them,

there is no help for them, or they will be blamed for the abuse (even by family and friends). They fear they will lose their job, their family, their home, or even worse- their abuser will follow through with his or her threats to harm or even kill them, their kids, family member, friends or even their pets. People who are suffering through domestic violence face enough challenges, being believed should not be one of them. In her story, the survivor wrote about how the community can have an impact on a victim reaching out for help.

"Every time a blind eye is turned to a black eye, we make it easier for the abuser to get away with it. The beginning of the end to domestic violence is education to the community that domestic violence is a serious crime and should be treated as such and educating victims that there is support out here and they don't have to stay. Reaching out for help is scary to those who don't know that support is just

a phone call away."

You do not need to be a trained domestic violence advocate to offer support and a listening ear to people who are reaching out.

"I didn't know that there would be this much support for me when I left. Victims need to know people will listen, believe them, and offer whatever they can do to help. It is only with strong community support that we are able to help the many victims in our area and end the cycle of violence."

NH Coalition Celebrates 35 Years of Advocacy!

We would like to take time to recognize the milestone New Hampshire has reached in the goal to end domestic and sexual violence. 35 years ago, in June of 1977, a group of women from across NH gathered together to address the issue of abuse that was affecting so many members of their families and communities. This determined group of women formed the New Hampshire Coalition on Battered Women, which later became The New Hampshire Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence.

Now made up of a 14 independent, statewide network of crisis centers, with trained staff and shelters, The Coalition still keeps their grassroots goal. The Coalition continues in ongoing work to educate and promote social change by holding societal systems accountable for their responses to domestic and sexual violence and stalking.

Just goes to show how a group of compassionate and dedicated people can change a community, a state, a nation, and the world. We still have a ways to go to reach our goal of ending domestic and sexual violence as well as stalking, but we will keep moving forward, with our progress as a reminder.

Since 1981 Voices Against Violence has been reaching out to and supporting victims and survivors of domestic violence, sexual violence, and stalking. Our advocates provide understanding, information, and support to victims, survivors, and non-offending family and friends. Our services include a 24-hour Crisis Line, Court Advocacy, Police and Hospital Accompaniment, Systems Advocacy, Emergency Shelter, Support Groups, and Education and Outreach. Domestic and sexual violence can take many forms including physical abuse, mental abuse, sexual assault, verbal threatening, and name calling. It can affect anyone at any time: friends, co-workers, relatives, children, teens, men, and women. By acknowledging the existence of domestic and sexual violence and stalking in our communities, we can raise awareness of the problem and enable both victims and witnesses to take action and break the cycle of violence.
